



Context - Background

- TLE represents a fundamental change in the engagement and future dialogue in the Northeast this is accomplished in several ways:
 - Settles an outstanding specific claim
 - Tangibly demonstrates the Province's commitment to reconciliation
 - Provides substantive land to Treaty 8 First Nations for many reasons (e.g., economic, cultural, spiritual)
 - Is the first expansion of Treaty 8 reserves in decades

TLE Form of Transfers


TLE Shortfall Land


- A historic land debt
 - Owed since the treaty was signed
 - Land will be transferred directly to Canada (to create Indian Reserve)

TLE Additional Land

- For reconciliation
 - Land will be purchased by the First Nations
 - Land may be considered for transfer to Canada as Indian Reserve (ATR)

*ATR = Addition to Reserve (Federal process to add land as Indian Reserve)





Status of Land Transfers

- Level and extent of engagement varies across the parcels
- Status of land transfers regarding:
 - Parcel stage (e.g., identification, review, implementation)
 - -Tenure holder engagement
 - -Stakeholder (public and interest groups)


Commitment to engage
