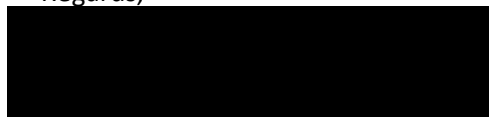
Our team is pleased to provide you with an update on the projects that have been funded under the PRRD Grant Writer Services program from December 1, 2022, to August 25, 2023. Within this report, you will find a program summary followed by an overview of the projects that have received funding. It is important to note that in addition to the projects and funds detailed in this summary, an additional 18 grant submissions are pending an outcome.

It's exciting to know that 32 community groups have used the grant writing services to date, some for more than one project. We have also engaged with an additional 29 groups to help them develop their projects so that they are grant-ready; this means we have reached 61 community groups to date.

In 2023, we hosted one information session and two workshops to help build regional grant writing capacity; 44 community members participated. Clear Course has now hosted seven information sessions and six workshops since 2021, reaching 133 participants. We also created a series of grant writing resources for the Grant Writer Services program that were shared with participants at these events.

We look forward to our continued work with the communities in the PRRD, supporting them as they grow their operations and services.

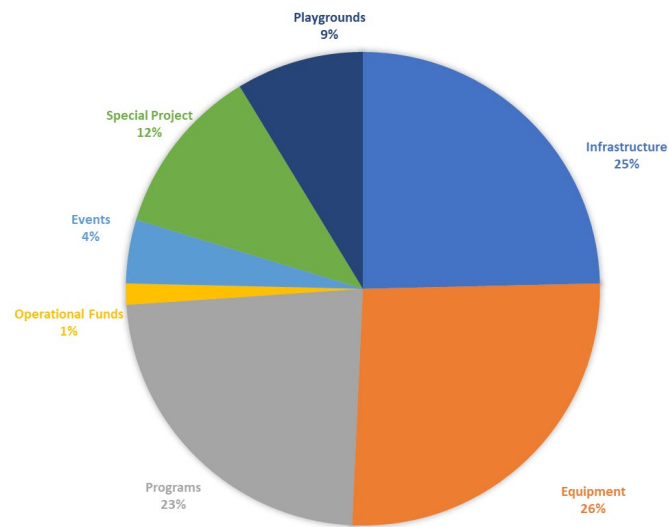

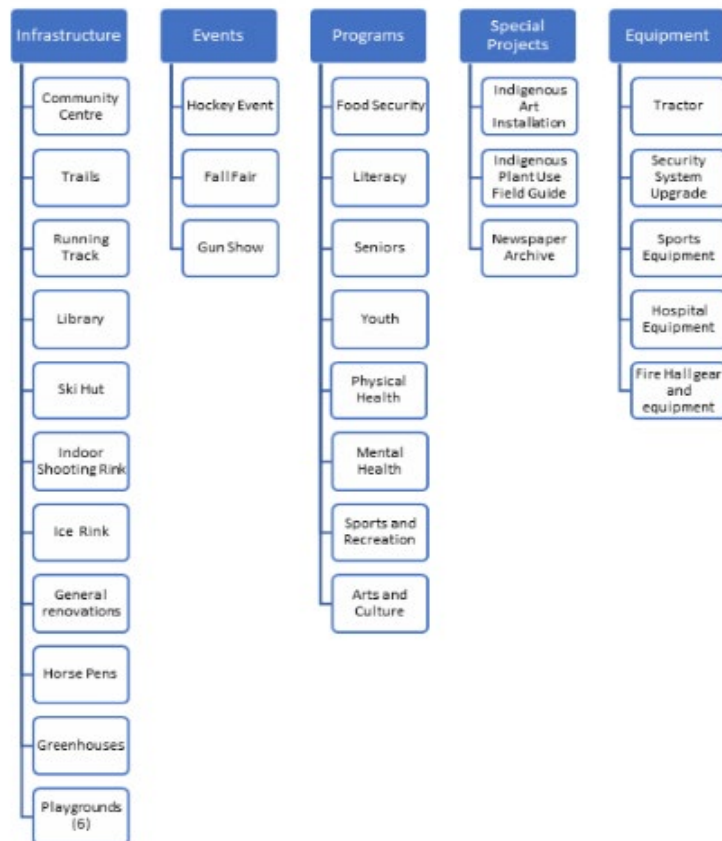

CLEAR COURSE OBSERVATIONS

Over the course of Clear Course's engagement with community groups in the Peace River Regional District, several themes have emerged—they are detailed below.

Project Development

Clear Course has observed that many community groups seeking grant writing services also need project development support. Project development refers to defining a project's scope, budget, timeline, resources, team, and more. Project development is an essential step that should precede applying for funding as it helps to define many of the components of a project that are evaluated in a grant application. Funding programs tend to favor projects that are well developed and have clearly defined risk mitigation plans, resourcing strategies, and deliverables.

Another common challenge observed within community organizations is project scope creep. Scope creep usually occurs when the project goals and objectives are altered to meet the funding program objectives. When the funding program objectives unduly influence the development of a project, it can lead to confused objectives and difficulty in prioritizing project activities.

While we are happy to meet groups where they are at, this preparatory work is ideally completed in advance of community groups seeking grant writing services; this will ensure the PRRD's grant writing program is focused on proposal writing and will likely result in more successful grant proposals.

Project Prioritization

Groups often have a multitude of meaningful projects they want to fund. Prioritizing which project to apply for and when, while ensuring the group's ability to implement, is an important consideration.

Project Management

Once a grant application is successful, the project must move ahead. This means the project must be implemented in accordance with the applicant's proposal and the funder's requirements. Common challenges faced by community organizations when it comes to project implementation and management include keeping up with the pace of the project, managing resources, and making sure the project stays on budget.

Funding Gaps

Occasionally, we observe gaps in funding. Our goal is to communicate these gaps to the PRRD so that the district can work with its partners, e.g., NDIT and UBCM, to find ways to bridge these gaps through new and improved grant programs. For example, Clear Course has worked with several groups seeking playground equipment and infrastructure—there is a current gap in this specific type of funding.
