Policing Report for June 2025.

The following information is provided as an update on crime statistics, police activity, and new developments within the detachment operations and administration up to and including the periods noted for calendar year to date.

#### **DETACHMENT RESOURCE REPORTING**

The Detachment is full compliment of regular RCMP Members is 31. For the Month of June, the detachment operated with the following staffing vacancies:

- -1 member was light duties, working 40 hours per week, but not operational.
- -1 member is on administrative duties.
- -2 members transferred out of Dawson Creek in June 2025.
- -4 frontline Constable positions were vacant.
- -1 new member graduated Saskatchewan Training Division the second week of June 2025 and has arrived.

#### **CRIME TREND REPORTING**

Over the period from January 1<sup>st</sup> to the end of June 2025, there were a total of 4120 calls for service. This is up from 4078 calls for service when compared to the same time period in 2024, or a increase of 1%. Of those 4120 files, 3333 of the calls for service were within the City of Dawson Creek and 786 calls for service were within the rural surrounding area, including the Village of Pouce Coupe, compared to 3244 and 834 for the same period last year.

The following trends have been outlined for the (Year to Date) period of January 1, 2025 to June 30th, 2025 pertaining to calls for service combined with pro-active investigations, enforcement, and education measures:

- Theft of vehicle
  - Year to date 2024 = 63
  - Year to date 2025 = 44
  - o Decrease of 30%
- Theft from vehicle
  - Year to date 2024 = 19
  - Year to date 2025 = 34
  - Increase of 79%
- Break and Enter to Residence
  - Year to date 2024 = 30
  - Year to date 2025 = 20
  - o Decrease of 33%
- Break and Enter to Business
  - Year to date 2024 = 29
  - Year to date 2025 = 10
  - o Decrease of 65%
- Assault/Assault with Weapon/Aggravated Assault
  - Year to date 2024 = 99
  - Year to date 2025 = 121
  - o Increase of 22%
- Sexual Assault/Sexual Interference
  - Year to date 2024 = 20
  - Year to date 2025 = 26
  - o Increase of 30%
- Drug Possession/Drug Trafficking
  - Year to date 2024 = 7
  - Year to date 2025 = 16
  - o Increase of 129%
- Impaired Driving (alcohol and drug), 24hr Suspensions, Immediate Roadside Prohibition
  - Year to date 2024 = 45
  - Year to date 2025 = 72
  - o Increase of 60%
- Motor Vehicle Collision
  - Year to date 2024 = 157
  - Year to date 2025 = 138
  - o Decrease of 12%
- Theft (including shoplifting)
  - Year to date 2024 = 160
  - Year to date 2025 = 188
  - o Increase of 17%
- Mental Health
  - Year to date 2024 = 300
  - Year to date 2025 = 384
  - o Increase of 28%
- Unspecified Assistance files
  - Year to date 2024 = 509
  - Year to date 2025 = 494
  - O Decrease of 3%

Property crime and Mental health related issues remain the majority of calls for service. Unspecified Assistance files continue to take most of the day to day resources. These are the calls for service that are not related to any "offence" such as suspicious occurrence or suspicious activity reports.

# Files involving members of our unhoused community.

There will be no year to date measures for dates prior to December 2024 as this is a new measure.

### Dawson Creek Citizens on Patrol

Citizens on patrol have been busy putting in hours and covering many kilometers while reporting suspicious activity to the RCMP. The program is vital in assisting the RCMP with extra eyes and ears in the community. S/Sgt HUGHES continues to attend Rural Crime Watch and C.O.P.S. meetings. Cpl UITENBOSCH has also taken a leadership role in this regard and is attending meetings when S/Sgt HUGHES is not able to attend. Recruiting measures are continuing in attempt to drawn new members to the group to increase patrols and available personnel for special events. The community benefits from these efforts and is clearly reflected in the reduction of property crime events in Dawson Creek.

# **Violence Suppression Efforts**

Dawson Creek continues to receive support from North District Major Crimes, Regional General Investigation Section, and neighbouring detachments as the need arises.

Dawson Creek local members have been engaged in an extra patrol initiative to target our repeat offenders, conduct curfew compliance checks and enforcement at known-to-police residences in our City.

Surge capacity from support units from across the Province continue to be available to respond to emergent community need.
